



A meeting of the member countries of WHO from South East Asia Region (SEAR) and Western Pacific region (WPR) that are endemic to rabies was held in Bangkok, Thailand from July, 16-18, 2024. The meeting deliberated on the current situation and issues of rabies in both humans and animals in the regions and member countries, and recommendations were drafted to address these problems. # "Little drops make an ocean."- MARWEL Association -Celebrating Republic Day in a different way!!!

MARWEL (Maruthoorkadavu Residence Welfare) Association a small 400 members (households) "Resident Association" spread out in half of the geographical area of Kalady, Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala has been celebrating 26th January in its unique way. For the last 27 years they have been working hard to protect their dogs and residents from rabies.

MARWEL started rabies vaccination for their owned dogs 27 years back on 26.01.1998 in collaboration with rabies control program of Department of Animal Husbandry. A few years later, when some hiccup happened in running the campaign, MARWEL took ownership of the program and started running it on its own. They have been doing it every year on the same day for the last 27 years without missing a beat. They set up on an empty plot of land from 9 am to 2 pm for vaccination.

Before the campaign they do three things to get the word out. First they put ads in newspapers. Second in the MARWEL WhatsApp group and thirdly distribute campaign notices to each household. The campaign started with just 10 dogs in the first year. Every year, the number of participants has been going up. Even dogs from nearby places who actually aren't part of the association come and get vaccinated. On an average 50-70 dogs get vaccinated in the program every year. This year (26.01.2025), 52 dogs and 1 cat attended the campaign. The association covers some of the expenses like setting up the venue, the cost of vaccines and other logistics. Pet owners pay a small fee.

It was probably a veterinarian working for the government (now retired) who is residing in the locality started this unique movement. He is the one who has been facilitating the program by providing technical support, like getting (selecting) quality vaccines, arranging a vet to vaccinate and issuing vaccination certificates etc. for free. He is like a local "James Harriot" !!! A few of his veterinary colleagues also supported him now and then.

A nearby private veterinary clinic (Pet City Pet Hospital) was impressed with their work and has also started offering technical support to them. The venue has also been used by researchers from the Animal Husbandry Department, Kerala for their scientific studies. A PPP model!!! This year, the Indian Veterinary Association (Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala) teamed up with MARWEL and gave them a shout-out for their awesome work in the fight against rabies. IVA has offered all support in future.

Mr. Parameswaran Kutty, Secretary, MARWEL says that no cases of rabies (in animals or people) have been reported in their area for the last 20 years though they do face stray dog menace...A regional rabies freedom!!! Isn't it?





#### **DECISION TO TREAT**





#### RABIES IMUNOGLOBULIN - RIG DOSAGE

- The maximum dosage for HRIG is 20 IU/Kg of the body weight and that of ERIG is 40 IU/Kg of bodyweight.
- The entire imunoglobulin dose or as much as anatomically feasible but possibly avoiding compartment syndrome, should be carefully infiltrated into or as close as possible to the wound(s) or exposure site.
- Do not give RIG beyond the 7th day after the 1st vaccine dose on day 0.
- \*\*In previously vaccinated individual/s where direct nerve exposure is suspected treating physician may consider RIG infiltration
